Inspection Committee:

The current Inspection Committee was elected at the General Assembly in Lisbon, Portugal in November 2021. The Inspection Committee is comprised of Mr. Piotr Marek (Member), Ms. Sari Tuunainen (Member) and Mr. Jan Minkhorst (Chair). In 2023 during the General Assembly in Singapore Mr. Jan Minkhorst stepped down and Ms. Irena Cikotiene was elected the new Chair. The Inspection Committee reviewed ICCE accounts and financial activities and reports regularly to the annual Board meetings and biennial General Assembly.

ICCE Global Office:

The ICCE office continues to be hosted by Leeds Beckett University (LBU) and managed by Karen Livingstone. Regular meetings with Peter Mackreth, Dean of the Carnegie School of Sport at Leeds Beckett University and his team secure the ongoing co-operation and hosting of the Global Coaching Office. The most recent meeting took place in Leeds in October when ICCE president John Bales visited LBU and met with Sergio Lara-Bercial, ICCE Vice President of Strategy and Development and Pete.

Several Leeds Beckett colleagues participate in and support the international activities of ICCE. Guillermo Calvo, Ruth Brazier, Gary Hodgson and Megan Hill provide significant assistance in EU and international projects coordinated by ICCE or Sport Coaching Europe, enhancing the capacity of the organization.



ICCE Sport Coaching Europe (SCE) is an independent legal entity fully owned and operated by the ICCE Global Office in the UK, yet complies with all legal and financial regulations in the host country Malta where it is registered. Therefore, SCE is eligible for EU projects' funding. The SCE Office is hosted by Malta College of Arts, Science and Technology (MCAST) based on the MoU between ICCE and MCAST signed in early 2023. SCE Advisory Group had their initial meeting in April 2023 in Malta. Terms of Reference for SCE and finalization of Advisory Board lead by Kirsi Hämäläinen are in progress.



ICCE Partners:

Cooperation between ICCE and IOC Olympic Solidarity started in 2012. Several ICCE activities have been acknowledged by OS and ICCE has been invited to meet OS management several times to discuss activities of mutual interest. The Quadrennial Plan maintained the position of the ICCE as a partner regarding Technical Courses for Coaches program. OS proposed several new options to the NOCs where ICCE might play an important role.

The ICCE attended the ASOIF Sport Development and Education Group (ASDEG) to present its activities and establish greater network with all the International Federations. This forum took place in November 2024 and was very positive.

Research Committee

The Research Committee has been active, continuing to develop links between research and practice. To this end, we have set up a number of sub-committees working to develop areas of importance, such as partnerships, ISCJ editorial board and events. For example, in consultation with John Bales, we designed a series of webinars to disseminate research activities. We successfully ran 'Ethical Dilemmas in Sport' on 26th March 2025 and have scheduled a Parasport webinar.

In conjunction with Human Kinetics, we have continued the 'ISCJ Outstanding Coaching Article Award'. The sub-committee reviewed Volumes 10 & 11 of ISCJ to select 6 finalists and overall winner. This will be celebrated at GCC in Athens. Similarly, links have been established with the ICCE Ethics Committee, in collaboration with Lorraine Lafreniere, and a major survey was launched to highlight the current ethical landscape in sport coaching. Results and next steps will be presented in Athens.

The Research Committee advertised and recruited 2 new members to replace current members who were demitting. There were 10 applications, and the successful applicants will be announced at the GCC, after board approval.

In the run-up to Athens 2025, the RC reviewed 220 abstracts, a significant increase in numbers, and informed the successful applicants. The programme has been designed to allow a number of types of presentation modes; poster, oral, discussion and symposium. We also arranged 2 keynotes, in conjunction with other ICCE committees.



International Sport Coaching Journal

Still publishing three issues per year, 2024-2025 continues to increase record-high publication numbers. Due to a backlog of articles published "ahead of print" and housed on the website until placed in an issue, we have increased the number of publications in each issue from about 14 to 18 (plus the Digest), and we are considering having four issues per year. We had a special issue published in January 2025 entitled: *Transitions in Sport Coaching*. The journal's relationship with the ICCE continues to grow with the third supplementary issue publication of the ICCE 15th Global Coach Conference abstracts and integration with the ICCE's Research Committee.

In 2023, ISCJ received its first Impact Factor at 1.7. This increased to 1.8 in 2024 and we anticipate that it will continue to increase for 2025. ISCJ is also indexed with Scopus, Google Scholar, ProQuest, and Web of Science. The editorial board currently composes Dr. Callary as Editor, 4 Associate Editors, 23 board members, and 2 digest editors. The internationally diverse editorial board is selected based on content expertise, geographical location, and other demographic details. Board members are invited based on their past experience reviewing and submitting to ISCJ and they must contribute to and complement the Board's expertise in sport coaching research. In 2024, Pete Van Mullem was recognized as ISCJ's Editorial Board member of the year with extremely high ratings on multiple reviews in addition to submitting his own work in ISCJ in that time period.

ISCJ is available to institutions in low- and middle-income countries through a partnership between Human Kinetics Journals and Research4Life (R4L) that started in 2025. Eligible research organizations, libraries, universities, and other institutions now have access to all ISCJ content online at no cost. R4L's mission is to build an inclusive, diverse, and equitable scholarly communications environment with the goal to significantly increase participation of researchers from lower income countries in the global research community while still supporting local research networks. ISCJ benefits from the global reach R4L provides, and it is our hope that our aligned missions will help support coaching and coach development in low- and middle-income countries.

For the 15th GCC, working with the ICCE's Research Committee and led by Dr. Don Vinson, we adjudicated the 2nd biannual *ISCJ Outstanding Coaching Article Award*, presented at the ICCE Global Coach Conference. The winner of this award is the article entitled: "McCarthy, L., & Roberts, C.-M. (2023). A project-led framework for coach development in English men's professional football: A premier league case study, which was published in issue 11, volume 3 by Liam McCarthy and Claire-Marie Roberts https://doi.org/10.1123/iscj.2023-0015. We congratulate the authors on a fine contribution.


ICK are pleased to report the following activity during the last two years:

Driven by a recent needs-analysis spanning 11 countries across four continents and shared at the Global Conference in Singapore, the Emerging Nations Working Group is ready

to revitalize its initiative with renewed ambition, clarity, and energy. At the 15th ICCE Global Coach Conference in Athens, a focused deliberation will be convened to crystallize the group's vision, sharpen its objectives, and mobilize a dedicated leadership cohort ready to support emerging nations in elevating their sports-coaching landscapes.

Why this matters:

Emerging nations face unique combinations of opportunity and challenge: diverse cultural contexts, limited infrastructure, and a growing appetite to develop world-class coaching systems. By connecting these countries with robust frameworks, global best practices, and dynamic partnerships, ICCE plays a decisive role in accelerating coaching development where impact is greatest.

Renewed Objectives:

- 1. Recognize and build on the findings of the 11-country needs analysis.
- 2. Embrace both similarity and diversity of context to refine and share best-practice models.
- 3. Shape a high-quality publication for the *International Sport Coaching Journal (ISCJ)* to amplify this work.
- 4. Recruit and empower a leadership cohort of members aligned to Emerging Nations (EN) leadership roles.
- 5. Translate research into practice across continents from data to programme delivery.
- 6. Forge stronger connections and dynamic partnerships between developed and emerging nations.
- 7. Launch knowledge-exchange platforms: joint workshops, mentorships, peer-networks.

Call to action:

Visionary professionals with passion, experience and fresh ideas in sports coaching are invited to join this EN cohort. This call is for those ready to help the group design innovative activities, drive meaningful engagement, and support emerging countries in transforming their coaching ecosystems. ICCE Coach Developer Program

A major achievement has been the publication and dissemination of the second edition of the *ICCE Coach Developer Framework*, created by a global team of coach developer practitioners and academics. This significant and lengthy document has been very well received and has guided the further development of many internation and national organisations. A second document *Building your Coach Developer Workforce* was published as condensed version of the framework targeting the management and technical leaders of organisations. It explains the importance of coach developers in building quality coaching system through the implementation of three key steps.

Several workshops were run by the ICCE for international sport federations. In March 2024, the *International Ice Hockey Federation* commissioned a workshop for its internal staff (finance, marketing, education) to help them deliver more effective learning sessions by enabling them to structure and deliver sessions and information in a way that results in better learning and the desired behavoural change. This was followed up the following year with an intense Fast Track programme for IIHF personnel with significant experience of developing and supporting their coaches. A third workshop on facilitation skills was run with a cohort of less experience coach developers. In Parallel with the 2025 programmes, the ICCE trained a small group to become Trainers of Coach Developers. This innovative hands-on programme was highly successful ensuring the IIHF had a team who could sustain the coach developer work. In December 2024, *World Rowing* commissioned a customised workshop combining a technical programme with a facilitation programme for its coach developers. This unique programme was highly effective enabling them to create leaner-centred interactive learning programmes for their coaches.







The ICCE created two *new e-modules* on Learning and Reflective Practice. These have been piloted successfully with various programmes. It had been hoped to develop further innovative modules but two bids for Erasmus funding unfortunately proved unsuccessful. The ICCE is currently looking for ways to fund further development.





Established in 2014 with support from Japanese government funding, the Nippon Sport Science University Coach Developer Academy (NCDA) has played a pivotal role in developing coach developers in partnership with the International Council for Coaching Excellence (ICCE) leading up to the Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games. Even after the government funding ended, the academy continued its activities on a smaller scale, steadily advancing its mission.

In 2025, NCDA has once again been recognized under the Olympic Solidarity scholarship program, renewing its partnership with ICCE to deliver a revitalized international learning program. The 2025–26 cohort consists of fifteen participants — a diverse group representing all continents, carefully selected to ensure gender balance and varied sporting backgrounds. Some are supported through Olympic Solidarity scholarships, while others are self-funded.

Grounded in learner-centered principles, the program not only supports participants' learning but also serves as an experimental platform for the academy itself to explore innovative approaches to coach/coach developer development. Drawing from the newly revised Coach Developer Framework (Version 2), NCDA emphasizes experiential learning opportunities over traditional lectures, fostering authentic growth in coach developer competencies through shared inquiry, reflection, and practice.

Looking ahead, NCDA will continue to evolve and contribute to the global advancement of coach development with ICCE, strengthening its role as a hub for learning, innovation, and collaboration in the international community.









Global Coaches House

In partnership with **INSEP** (Institut national du sport, de l'expertise et de la performance) and **CREPS Île-de-France** (centre de ressources, d'expertise et de performance), the ICCE Global Coaches' House was held in Paris on August 6th and 7th during the Olympic Games and September 5th and 6th during the Paralympic Games.

Coaching leaders from five countries organized specific projects to bring potential future Olympic or Paralympic coaches to participate in Global Coaches House and experience the Games environment, and also contributed to the design of the program and identification of guest speakers: Mark Wolf from Switzerland (SwissCoach), Wiebke Fabinski from DOSB (Germany), Pia Pekonen from the Finnish Olympic Committee, Michael McGeehin from Sport Ireland, and Laura Watson from Canada. Over 230 High Performance Coaches from 29 countries attended GCH across the two sessions in Paris last summer.

Global Coaches House Paris 2024 was opened by Olympic pole vault gold medallist and former world record holder Sergii Bubka, Chair of the IOC Entourage Commission. The program included keynote presentations, workshops and discussions aimed at preparing coaches for future roles at an Olympic or Paralympic Games. The country delegations also organized activities to gain important Games experience, including visits to the Village and attendance at events. Our appreciation is extended to Mark Wolf from Swiss Coach for hosting the opening reception during the Paralympic GCH at Swiss House in downtown Paris.









ASEAN Activities

The ASEAN Centre of Excellence for Sports Coaching is an initiative focused on establishment of Coaching department at every ASEAN country and improving the quality of sports coaching and safe sports in the ASEAN (Association of Southeast Asian

Nations) region. Establishing a Coaching Academy or Department in each country within the ASEAN (Association of Southeast Asian Nations) region could have a significant impact on the development of sports, leadership, education, and overall well-being within the region. This initiative supported by Japan Sports Agency under Sports Tomorrow programme.

The ASEAN Centre of Excellence (COE) for Sports Coaching can serve as a powerful hub for leveraging information in the region by acting as a central platform for sharing, developing, and standardizing best practices in sports coaching.

Establishing ASEAN COE as a Regional ICCE affiliated and accredited partner. By positioning itself as an ICCE-aligned hub, the COE can:

- Become a recognized regional training and accreditation body.
- Influence national coaching policies to reflect global standards and innovations.
- Coordinate Regional aspirations to further improve coaching standards and coaches' development.
- Share and contribute ASEAN expertise and best practices to the international coaching community.

Malaysia's initiatives to host the BWF coaching courses, particularly through the establishment of the ASEAN Centre of Excellence for Sports Coaching are primarily aimed at strengthening the coaching capabilities of ASEAN Member States .BWF Coach Education Level 1 is the most fundamental course in the BWF Coach Education framework, designed for those new to coaching who have some knowledge of the game.









Cooperation with ASDEG/ASOIF

Following the meeting of the ICCE council in Porto (POR), and assistance from ICCE board member Deqa Niamkey (World Wrestling) it was agreed that ICCE would attend the next ASDEG Forum in order to present its activities and establish greater network with all the IFs.

Topic of the agenda item 7 Coaching Licenses & Certification:

John Bales (President) and Sergio Lara-Bercial (Vice-President) of the International Council for Coaching Excellence (ICCE) outlined their mission to professionalize sport coaching worldwide, focusing on collaboration, innovation, and education. The discussion emphasized the critical role of coach licensing, certification, and developer training in elevating coaching standards.

Key Themes Discussed:

- ICCE's strategic focus advances its mission through: Knowledge generation and exchange.
- Facilitating global coaching networks.
- Leadership in representation and advocacy.
- Partnerships and collaborations with organizations like the IOC, European Commission, and international federations support unified progress in coaching standards.
- Training programs aim to make Coach Developers "experts in learning," focusing on mentorship, reflective skills, and quality assessment in real-world settings.

Key Takeaways for Federations:

Commit to Professional Development: Elevate coaching standards through structured licensing, certification, and training programs tailored to modern needs. **Foster a Learning Environment:** Encourage a culture of self-reflection, mentorship, and continuous improvement among coaches.

Innovate to Stay Relevant: Adapt to evolving sports dynamics by integrating education-focused strategies that support both coaches and their participants.

In addition to the ASDEG workshop, we met with Elizabeth Pike regarding the WISH Programme and the future of the programme.

- WISH programme under ICCE patronage

Coaches' Associations Working Group

A Strategy of Unification, Data, and Global Impact

1. Strategic Outreach & Tangible Outcomes

Following his appointment by the ICCE in February 2023 to lead the Working Group for Coaches Associations, Mr. Athanasios D. Villiotis focused on initiating dialogue and building connections with coaches and sports experts from over 15 countries worldwide, including initial teleconferences with representatives from Romania, Slovenia, Malta, Cyprus, Bulgaria, North Macedonia, and Montenegro. This effort was systematically concentrated on the Balkan and Mediterranean regions as a strategic priority, yielding significant, measurable milestones:

- Initial teleconferences and communications were conducted with coaches and sports experts from Romania, Slovenia, Malta, Cyprus, Bulgaria, North Macedonia, and Montenegro.
- Establishment Success (Malta): The first unified Malta Sports Coaches Association has been formally established.
- High-Level Commitment (Cyprus): A provisional representative body has been formed under the auspices of the Cyprus Olympians, following dedicated missions by the ICCE President and the Head of the Working Group and meetings with the director of the Presidential Palace in Nicosia and the Board of the Cyprus Sports Organization.
- Parliament-Level Launch (Romania): Progress is underscored by an official invitation to a special event at the Romanian Parliament in December 2025, marking the formal commencement of the process to establish the Romanian Sports Coaches Association.

2. Data-Driven Foundations for Growth

Through the distribution of a specialized questionnaire, crucial information regarding the status of coaches has been gathered from Cyprus, Malta, Romania, Bulgaria, Slovenia, Italy, and Turkey. This data provides a clear picture of existing conditions and serves as a cornerstone for targeted future strategies. Furthermore, preliminary discussions have been initiated with organizations from Slovenia, Bulgaria, and Serbia, while interest has also been expressed from Armenia.




3. Introducing CORE: A Unified Global Identity

To strengthen the identity, coherence, and global reach of the initiative, the Working Group proposes the official adoption of the name and logo CORE (Coaches Organizing for Rights and Excellence). This identity visually embodies the initiative's philosophy, symbolically positioning the coach as the core of the sports ecosystem. The strategy involves creating a dedicated digital platform on the ICCE website and active engagement on social media. The objective is to disseminate the initiative to coaches in various countries, informing them of the benefits arising from their unification at a national level, providing a road-map for establishing a Sports Coaching Association, applying the outcomes of the COACHFORCE 21 project, and highlighting the international advantages of their association's membership in the ICCE

4. Conclusion: The Path to a Unified Global Voice

It is acknowledged that the process of establishing coaches' associations is often arduous and time-consuming, requiring persistent effort to overcome entrenched cultures of individualism. However, this undertaking is undoubtedly worthwhile, as it aims to gradually unite coaches worldwide for the first time, forming robust national representative bodies. The subsequent integration of these bodies into the ICCE will ultimately create a powerful, unified global voice for the coaching profession, elevating its status and securing its future.

ICCE Women-in-Coaching Activities

ICCE remains strongly committed to building a balanced and diverse global coaching workforce — one that provides athletes with greater choice, broadens the talent pool, and enriches the overall quality of coaching.

Women-in-Coaching Lead, Pauline Harrison, continues to champion opportunities for women coaches and leaders in sport through advocacy, collaboration, and programme design. A key initiative in this space is the WISH (Women in Sport High-performance Pathway) programme — a partnership between IOC Olympic Solidarity and International Federations aimed at increasing the representation of women coaches at the Olympic Games.

Over the years, ICCE's leadership and advocacy for women in coaching has helped to create meaningful shifts in awareness, opportunity, and visibility. This work has also generated a number of valuable spin-offs, including:

- Greater visibility and recognition of women coaches, technical leaders, and coach developers across sports and regions.
- A growing international network of women in coaching who actively support and mentor each other, building a sustainable community of practice.
- Enhanced collaboration with International Federations, National Federations, and Continental Associations, leading to more inclusive coach education and development programmes.
- Research and policy influence, contributing to global conversations on equity, diversity, and the systemic barriers faced by women in coaching.
- Integration of women's leadership perspectives into ICCE conferences, webinars, and knowledge-sharing events, with more women featured as keynote speakers, facilitators, and expert contributors.
- Ripple effects at national and regional levels, with WISH graduates and ICCE affiliates leading local initiatives to advance women's participation and progression in coaching.

Despite these encouraging developments, significant challenges remain. Women are still under-represented at all levels of coaching — particularly in high-performance and leadership roles — and structural barriers continue to limit access and advancement.

ICCE acknowledges that progress requires sustained commitment, collaboration, and accountability across the global coaching system. The organization remains dedicated to driving change, amplifying women's voices, and ensuring that diversity and inclusion are not just aspirations, but embedded realities in the world of sport coaching.

International Coaching Degree Standards

In 2016, ICCE published the International Coaching Degree Standards (ICDS) in response to the need to support higher education institutions (HEI). As more organizations became familiar with the ICDS, ICCE was asked to consider an endorsement scheme to recognize those degrees operating at a mature level. A 2-year pilot programme took place leading to three HEI achieving endorsed status. As an outcome of the pilot programme the revised version of the ICDS document was created and one of the first endorsed Universities, Haaga-Helia University of Applied Sciences from Finland was asked to take a lead to organize the next round of the endorsement process.

The endorsement process is now open for the Universities. At the ICCE website the applicants can find a self-assessment tool (a short questionnaire) which will help them to pre-assess how their organization meets the standards. In case they decide to apply for the process there is the preliminary application form. The applicants who are accepted into the process fill out an information form in which they describe the content, structures and operating methods of the degree programme in great detail. The idea of the process is to act as a developmental audit. Two external auditors are invited to each process, who review the information and prepare for the endorsement event. The event is intended to be attended by several representatives of the applicant university and the central idea is not only to assess whether the university meets the required standards, but also to guide their own assessment of the strengths and areas for development of the degree programme.

In year 2024 one University applied and passed the endorsement process. In year 2025 two Universities are in the middle of the process.
